# Appalachian authors

# Alumni, faculty add to encyclopedia

ore than 20 MTSU alumni and several faculty members have made significant editorial contributions to the newly published Encyclopedia of Appalachia, a compre-

hensive reference guide that encompasses many facets of Appalachian culture.

The new title, with more than 2,000 entries, "serves as a one-stop reference for students, teachers, scholars and the general public as they seek information about Appalachia's land, people, economics, cultures and institutions," according to the encyclopedia's Web site (etsu.edu/cass).

Members of the MTSU community became involved with the East Tennessee State University project after Dr. Carroll Van West, director of MTSU's Center for Historic Preservation, was contacted

by its sister Center of Excellence—the Center for Appalachian Studies and Services at ETSU.

"I had occasion to meet (with ETSU center representatives) and help in initial planning for the project," West said. "I also agreed to be the section editor for architecture and ... I turned to many of our past M.A. historic preservation students that have built successful careers throughout the region (to contribute)."

West said he agreed to undertake the assignment not only because of his research interests in southern architecture, but also out of the conviction that Appalachia particularly suffers from stereotypes.

"All architecture in Appalachia is not composed of log cabins, as the Great Smoky Mountains National Park suggests," West said of the region along the Appalachian Mountains chain that stretches from northern Alabama to


"The section certainly includes an entry on log buildings," West remarked, "but it also includes such key American architectural landmarks as Frank Lloyd Wright's Fallingwater in Pennsylvania and the Grove Park Inn in North Carolina."

CHP-related contributions to the Encyclopedia of Appalachia serve to highlight the academic endeavors of MTSU's history department and

Dr. John McDaniel, dean of MTSU's College of Liberal Arts, said, "The newly published ency-

> clopedia on the historical roots and cultural accomplishments of Appalachia is an important addition to what can be broadly called Southern Studies —an addition to which the faculty and students in our history department and Center for Historic Preservation have made significant contributions.

With mentoring and partnering from senior faculty in the MTSU Public History Program," McDaniel noted, "graduate students have had a unique opportunity to experience the rigors and delights of researching and publishing in a vol-







# Hall, Rose, Yearwood join MT shrine

hree of the most successful athletes in the history of Middle Tennessee athletics—Vince Hall, Dionne Rose and the late Jack Yearwood—will become the 31st class inducted into the Blue Raider Hall of Fame, Saturday, Nov. 4, as part of Hall of Fame Weekend when the Blue Raider football team plays host to Sun Belt Conference foe Florida Atlantic.

"The 2006 class is characteristic of what we have come to expect in our honorees," said Jim Simpson, Varsity Club director. "They all represent the character, leadership, athleticism and deep love for this university that make them uniquely qualified to be members of the Blue Raider Sports Hall of Fame. Their stories are all remarkable, and we look forward to their induction in November."

Hall, nicknamed "Flea" for his uncanny balance and ability to avoid tacklers, practically re-wrote the record books at MTSU as it

pertained to rushing and still is prominent in almost every rushing category. Hall had 18 100-yard rushing games and three 200-yard games as a Blue Raider, including getting 100 yards in 10 of the 14 games during his senior year. Named to the All-OVC teams in 1983 and 1984, he was also selected the OVC Offensive Player of the Year in 1984. Hall still holds the single-season rushing record, gaining 1,439 yards in 1984. He ranks No. 1 in rushing yards per game all-time with an average of 130.8 yards per con-

Rose (B.S. '05) was the first female All-American at Middle Tennessee in any sport, achieving the honors twice in the high hur-

dles and twice in the long jump. While at Middle Tennessee, she set four indoor school records and two outdoor and was the NCAA Champion in the indoor high hurdles and the OVC Track Woman of the Year in 1994. Rose still holds indoor Blue Raider records in the long jump, the 55-meter dash and the 55-meter hurdles, and outdoor records in the long jump and 100-meter hurdles. Rose was also a member of the record-setting 1994 relay team (4 X 100-meter)

Recruited by Coach "Wink" Midgett to Middle Tennessee for the fall of 1942, Yearwood (B.S. '49) played in every quarter of every game during that season, playing both offense and defense.

Yearwood proudly served his country during World War II from 1943 to '46, escaping a German POW camp while on a march and weighing only 115 pounds. He returned to MTSC to finish his education, again playing both offense and defense for the Blue

Raiders, along with holding down an outfield position on the baseball team. He was an all-conference performer for both of his last two years in football, while being named to the Who's Who in America's Colleges in 1948.

Yearwood earned a master's at Peabody College and taught and coached in Tennessee and Florida, retiring from coaching in 1974 and teaching until 1983. He died this summer.

"This gives me a sense of pride and honor, and I didn't even think much about the Hall of Fame until later on in my life," Yearwood said earlier this year.
