Naval intelligence director Cothron shares experiences

Alumnus and U.S. Navy Rear Adm. Tony L. Cothron ('77) brought his knowledge and wisdom gained through career experiences to share with MTSU students, faculty, staff and alumni during an April 8 visit to campus.

"The purpose of the admiral's visit was to highlight possible career options for history majors and to enhance our military history program," said alumnus Dr. Derek Frisby ('94), assistant professor in the Department of History. "The students and faculty were able to interact on a very personal level with a distinguished MTSU history alum and discuss the importance of

history and critical thinking skills in various career fields.


"They also gained some insight into the extremely complex intelligence community and the role intelligence played in the Iraq war and war on terrorism."

Cothron is the director of intelligence for the Chief of Naval Operations and the 62nd director of Naval Intelligence. His lecture was titled "U.S. National Security Policy and Decision-Making: Insights on How and Why Our Nation Is at War."

Cothron commanded the U.S. European Command's Joint Analysis Center at Royal Air Force Molesworth, U.K., from August 2001 to July 2003, transforming the command in response to the global war on terrorism and supporting combat operations against Iraq during Operation Iraqi Freedom. He also commanded the Navy's national level, operational intelligence and scientific and intelligence analysis center, the Office of Naval Intelligence from September 2004 to January 2006. Upon his promotion to flag rank, Cothron was assigned to the National Security Agency as deputy director of Signals Intelligence for Customer Relationships.

Cothron said U.S. forces' efforts in Iraq have worked, that the area has been stabilized and terrorists' numbers have decreased. He does warn that the threat of terrorist attack will not go away.

He made a reference to a world map showing 19 al-Qaida terrorist attacks in the past six or seven

Frisby said Cothron's visit is "just one of several events designed to highlight and bolster our military history program." The MTSU Veterans Memorial will be dedicated this fall to remember all MTSU veterans, especially the more than 60 who have died in the service of their country, he added. Next spring, Frisby will lead a study abroad tour of Guam, Peleliu and Iwo Jima. Also in April 2009, the military history program will serve as host to the Society of Military History annual meeting in Murfreesboro to discuss the topic "Warfare and Culture."

Summer Reading adventure for new freshmen

'Three Cups of Tea' author will speak at Aug. 24 University Convocation

What can one person accomplish? MTSU's 2008 Summer Reading Program selection, "Three Cups of Tea: One Man's Mission to Promote Peace ... One School at a Time," by Greg Mortenson and David Oliver Relin, has the answer.

The memoir, touted by NBC's Tom Brokaw as "thrilling" and "one of the most remarkable adventure stories of our time," details Mortenson's quest to build schools in Pakistan and Afghanistan.

Mortenson, the co-founder (with Dr. Jean Hoerni) and executive director of the nonprofit Central Asia Institute and Pennies for Peace, has dedicated his life to promote community-based education and literacy programs, especially for girls, in remote mountain regions of Pakistan and Afghanistan.

His quest began in 1993, when to honor his late sister's memory, Mortenson climbed Pakistan's K2, the world's second highest mountain, in the Karakoram Range. While recovering in a local village called Korphe, the Montana resident met a group of children sitting in the dirt writing with sticks in the sand and made a promise to help them build a school.

Dr. Laurie Witherow, MTSU's Academic Support Center director and coordinator of the Summer Reading Program, is encouraging faculty to incorporate this latest text into their fall 2008 syllabi.

"'Three Cups of Tea' would be a perfect start-

ing point for discussions on a wide range of topics and is especially recommended for use in communications, education, geography, psychology, sociology, political science and history courses," Witherow said. "Students come to us in the fall expecting to discuss the Summer Reading selection in classes from a variety of perspectives and use it as the basis of assignments."


"All new students are required to read the book before their arrival on campus in the fall, so 'Three Cups of Tea' may be perfect as the basis for an early writing or other assignment. This program's success depends on the involvement of faculty who make use of the Summer Reading selection in fall classes, so let us know if you'd like to use the book in your classes this fall. We want our freshmen to recognize that one person can make a difference; they can make a difference."

Incoming freshmen are expected to read the book before fall classes start Aug. 25, and all University 1010 classes once again will discuss the selection.

Mortenson also is scheduled to address attendees Sunday, Aug. 24, at the annual University Convocation beginning at 2 p.m. in Murphy Center.

"Three Cups of Tea" may be purchased on campus and at local bookstores. It's available in hardback and paperback, and online sellers also may have used copies.


in the next year. Thank you to all our alumni and guests who helped paint the zoo BLUE, and we look forward to seeing you the next time we are in your area.

many MTSU projects. They were among the first donors to enter into a significant estate plan with MTSU. They donated some \$100,000 to establish and endow two Leadership/Performance Scholarships. She continues to support athletics, the School of Music and Alumni Relations' initiatives. A 1998 Distinguished Alumna, Rhea promotes her alma mater through leadership positions in the MTSU Foundation, Blue Raider Athletic Association and National Alumni Association. She remains active in raising funds for the MTSU Rutherford County Alumni Scholarship fund through the annual Pigskin Pre-Game.

The Chancellor's Citation for Excellence in Philanthropy recognizes generous giving of resources for a TBR institution and outstanding volunteer efforts in raising money for the institution.

Smith, who played baseball for former Coach John Stanford in the mid-1970s, has been instrumental in helping secure the needed funds (\$5 million) to begin construction on a baseball stadium that will be completed soon. MTSU dedicated the Stephen B. Smith Clubhouse and Indoor Training Facility in '98. Altogether, he and the Stephen Smith Charitable Foundation have donated more than \$410,000 to MTSU.

The Career Achievement Award is given to a full-time faculty member who has demonstrated profound, sustained and high-quality contributions in the areas of teaching, innovation, publication and research/creative activity as well as service to the university, community and the profession.

Carlton, professor of physics and astronomy and a Fellow of the Royal Astronomical Society, is a distinguished scholar in nuclear physics and an advocate for the role of research as a foundation to learning as well as its contribution to knowledge in the discipline. His career has helped shape both his chosen discipline and the role of research across the curriculum at MTSU at the undergraduate and graduate levels. As a result of his efforts, the experiences of students campuswide have been enriched through scholarship and hands-on,

research-based learning.

Carlton earned his undergraduate degree in mathematics and physics from MTSU and then achieved his master's and Ph.D. in physics at the University of Georgia. A prolific writer, he has published many articles in international peer-reviewed journals throughout his career and has produced annual Technical Progress Reports for the Department of Energy. The results of his research have been invaluable to others using the nuclear models in their own research. He has held the position of senior scientist for NASA and served as a consultant with Oak Ridge National Laboratories. He has chaired the Department of Physics and Astronomy since its creation in 1995 and will retire June 30.

The John T. Bragg Distinguished Service Award is presented to an MTSU alumnus or nonalumnus for outstanding leadership within the university and the community.

Hood, a six-term state representative who has announced he will retire at the end of the current term, is renowned for leadership roles in his community and beloved alma mater. He has served on the House Education Committee, House Finance, Ways and Means Committee and Higher Education subcommittee. He spent 10 years on the executive administration staff of MTSU; in subsequent years, he has been a volunteer and supporter of the university and is a past president of the National Alumni Association and a 1976 Distinguished Alumnus.

The Distinguished Alumni Award honors alumni for exemplary professional achievement, leadership and/or service to the university and/or community.

The Professional Achievement honoree is Seivers, who served as Tennessee Commissioner of Education from her appointment by Gov. Phil Bredesen in 2003 until stepping down in January. As commissioner, she led the department in many initiatives to help fulfill its mission to provide quality education for every child in Tennessee. Before her appointment, Seivers had served as a teacher, principal and superintendent in Oak Ridge

Schools and Clinton City Schools.

The Service to the University recipient is Trail, an attorney who began private practice of law in Murfreesboro. Her involvement with MTSU began almost simultaneously when she was nominated as a Foundation trustee. With her legal and accounting background (she's a certified public accountant), she revised many Foundation organizational documents and began assisting with negotiation and preparation of contracts and agreements for the Foundation.

Prince earned the Service to the Community honor. He has devoted his life to serving others, first in the military for more than 20 years and then through the Lions Club, which he joined in 1980. He volunteers to screen children's eyes to detect and correct vision problems. He graduated from MTSC as a Distinguished Military graduate and was commissioned as a second lieutenant in the U.S. Army. Prince served in Korea and Vietnam, retiring as a lieutenant colonel in 1978. His military honors include the Bronze Star and Republic of Vietnam Gallantry Cross Unit Citation.

The Young Alumni Achievement Award recognizes a young alumnus for his or her professional achievement, outstanding leadership abilities and/or service to the university and/or community.

Barnett has logged some impressive experience as an independent producer, engineer and author since earning his MTSU degree. He has worked at prominent facilities in Los Angeles such as The Enterprise, Skip Saylor Recording and Pacific Ocean Post. He has engineered multiplatinum and Grammy-winning albums and engineered for artists such as Keith Urban, LeAnn Rimes, George Jones, Reba McEntire, Trace Adkins, Alan Jackson, Faith Hill, Brad Paisley, N'Sync and Stephen Curtis Chapman. He has given back to the Department of Recording Industry by working as an adjunct professor and by helping develop new courses.

New literacy Ph.D. to help rethink, reteach reading

Experienced and successful educators with graduate degrees and a minimum of three years of field experience will be returning to MTSU in the fall because they realize that what they already know about teaching reading isn't enough to transform every child into a skilled reader.

School psychologists, speech-language pathologists, reading teachers, classroom teachers and school administrators at all levels will be among those seeking MTSU's new doctoral degree in literacy studies. This program will address why the National Assessment of Education Progress consistently shows that an average of four out of 10 children fail to read at grade level by fourth grade.

The interdisciplinary doctorate is

based on the idea that narrow expertise in one area does not equip grads to understand the many factors that support successful literacy.

The new program is a first-of-its-kind partnership that has emerged from the Center for the Study and Treatment of Dyslexia at MTSU, a hands-on learning lab that may be the only one of its kind in the nation.

The Dyslexia Center is a unit in the College of Education and Behavioral Science where professionals with different backgrounds work together to improve educational outcomes for children with dyslexia.
